Unregulated Drug Poisoning Deaths: A Public Health Crisis

Since April 2016, British Columbia has been in the midst of a public health emergency of fatal drug poisonings. In the region that Island Health serves, more than 2,744 people have died of a drug poisoning (overdose) since the start of the emergency.

These were our family members, friends, colleagues, community members and loved ones who were lost. While we grieve, the emergency continues to harm communities across all regions of the province and all demographic groups.

Youth: Deaths in BC


2019-2023: Unregulated drug poisoning was the leading cause of unnatural death among youth in BC. Youth continue to be impacted by the crisis.

A special report on youth unregulated drug poisoning deaths in BC shows that of the 10,005 unregulated drug poisoning deaths reported in 2019-2023,


126 deaths

were youth under 19 years old.

Another 20 youth lost their lives in 2024.



The Island Health region accounted for **28%** of these deaths.






2019-2023:

The **majority** of poisoning deaths happen **inside homes.**

54% private residence; 22% other residence; 20% outside



The female proportion of deaths increased from 22% in 2016-2023 to **26% in 2024**.

In 2024, 85% of drug poisoning deaths involve **fentanyl**, a powerful opioid.

In 73% of drug poisoning deaths in 2024, the substance was consumed by **smoking**.

11% snorting; 10% injection; 4% oral

In 2024, many Island Health communities continue to have a higher rate of death than BC overall.
