

Stabilizing health-care services in North Vancouver Island

Island Health Board in North Vancouver Island

On July 3 and 4, the Island Health Board and executive team were very pleased to visit the North Vancouver Island communities of Port McNeill, Port Hardy, Port Alice, Alert Bay and 'Namgis Nation, the latter two communities located on Cormorant Island. The two-day engagement included a public forum on the evening of July 3, followed by site and community visits throughout the day on July 4.

The public forum was a significant opportunity to meet with community partners and area residents to share about the ongoing efforts to stabilize health-care services in local communities and hear directly from residents. In addition, attendees learned more about the Mount Waddington Health Network and its ongoing efforts to support residents with their health and wellness. Board members and executive met with community partners for a breakfast Thursday morning to discuss the importance of upholding, nurturing, and progressing relationships with local First Nations communities. These relationships are of upmost importance to Island Health, particularly in North Vancouver Island where nearly 30% of the population identifies as Indigenous.

Following the partnership breakfast, Board members broke into smaller groups and visited staff and toured facilities including Port McNeill Hospital, Port Hardy Hospital, Port Alice Health Centre, and Cormorant Island Health Centre. Two community-based services in Port Hardy, the Salvation Army Centre of Hope and New Beginnings, were also visited.

Island Health Board and executive appreciated the warm welcome from local community leaders and are committed to ongoing partnership and collaboration to ensure health services are accessible and meeting the needs of residents.
